I've taken up tapestry again and this year I'm planning to complete a chair. I started doing tapestry when I was 10 years old. I used to buy canvases from Tapisserie, which was then on Walton Street, SW3, next door to my mother's shop. My mother [Nina Campbell] and its owner, Hayat Palumbo, were great friends and Hayat taught me how to stitch. I am stitching canvases and also starting to use a lot of tapestry in my work. We've been working on a fender stool and upholstering the seat of an antique cockpen chair and a pair of stools with tapestry. I love adding this texture to a room. It is completely bespoke and any time I get the opportunity to find an alternative to buying new fabric by the metre I make the most of it. I think that is where you start to get the personal detail into a room.

We are currently exploring browns. It was never a colour that I was drawn to, as I thought it could be too dark, but I have learned to love it and now want to explore all shades of it. I'm particularly keen on 'London Brown' and 'Etruscan Brown' from Edward Bulmer Natural Paint.

The preservation of nature is a focus for the studio this year. We'll be doing this by using specialist finishes that are more environmentally sustainable and have a local source. For example, the wonderful Simon Orrell creates straw marquetry inlays painstakingly by hand in his London atelier. I also want to use more wool. As an advocate for The Campaign for Wool, I've visited mills in Scotland, Ireland and England in the past year and am blown away by the manufacturing capability and creative vision on offer in companies like Anta. Wool drapes beautifully and has excellent environmental credentials.

I spent my childhood painting and decorating for my mother using white gloss. It is overdue for a revival. Pure white has been neglected for too long by us so-called smart decorators, but it absolutely has its place – a sharp white on old painted surfaces can highlight age and texture beautifully. I would love to combine white with 'Putti' and 'Orange Aurora' from Little Greene Paint & Paper. We all have a rollover resolution, don't we? Mine will always be to give up the ordinary.

I predict a resurgence of the Seventies. Having recently fallen in love with glass bricks, we are planning to use more of them in 2023. They're not just robust, but they can also become a showpiece and are such a great way to be creative. We buy ours from Glass Blocks Direct.
